I arrived for the Opera Volunteer International Focus and Board Meeting on Thursday, November 12, and was met by Felicia Gates, co-chair of the meeting who led me on a private tour of her city which included the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum, the Tennessee State Capitol building, the War Memorial Plaza and the Tennessee Performing Arts Complex (TPAC). We walked through the beautiful 100 year old Hermitage Hotel, and the fabulous Nashville Library, with its remarkable reading room on the 3rd floor. The tour took in so many sights and we were never more than a few blocks away from the Downtown Sheraton, our meeting hotel. We returned



One of Vancouver Opera Guild's projects is to sponsor two teachers to attend the "Music! Words! Opera!" workshop put on by Vancouver Opera. In August we met with the teachers to discuss the musical concert they will put on in December. In September The OGV's board of directors held a brainstorming session titled "Looking to the Future". There were two main topics discussed: (1) How can the Guild increase their active membership and identify individuals with specific skills? And (2) How can we increase public and financial support to meet the objects of the Guild?

#### Opening of the NOAH LIFF OPERA CENTER

The grand opening of the new Noah Liff Opera Center culminated with a community open house and festival on May 3, 2009, hosted by the Nashville Opera Guild volunteers. Dr. Morel Enoch Harvey, chairman of the event, organized and inspired over 80 NOG volunteers (some in opera costumes) to welcome 500 guests from the Middle-Tennessee area to see the new facility. Some of the activities offered to children and adults on that rainy afternoon were karaoke, face painting and tours of the building. Guests could try on opera wigs and costumes, handle props, put on make-up and be photographed in the process. The outreach performance of The Magic Flute was presented to an enthusiastic audience and "The Opera Quiz" table challenged attendees to test their knowledge of opera (no one failed). Bright colored balloons and other favors added to the fun spirit of the Festival.

The goals of the Opera Festival were to educate the community and their interested friends about opera, to create new audiences, and to welcome everyone to Nashville Opera's new home. The feed-back showed that they were successful on all accounts.

As the "Festival Season" of Glimmerglass Opera got underway the Glimmerglass Opera Guild sprang into action sponsoring a welcoming reception called "eat and greet" for new and returning artists, orchestra members, and production staff (over 300 attended). Then at each of three opera openings, they created a reception (attended by between 200 and 300 guests) following the performance. Throughout the season Guild members distributed picnic lunches to patrons and prepared "changeover" lunches and suppers for production staff on days when there were two performances.

A climax to the summer activities was a Gala Dinner and Auction at the Otesaga Hotel. The Gala was hosted by General Manager, John Irvin and his wife Nancy. The main auction item was a week's stay in an apartment in Paris, and entertainment was provided by members of the Opera's Young American Artists Program. Grossing approximately \$10,000, the Gala funded the Doris P. Shields Artistic Administration Intern, a position supported by the Guild and commemorating a longtime member of the organization.
